Pirates cash in



No. 1 team nips No. 3 Lakeville North as Chavis takes over

They don't call him "Cash" for nothing. Casmir "Cash" Chavis was money in the bank down the stretch to lift topranked Park Center over No. 3 Lakeville North 81-79, capped by his game-winner as time ran out, in a marquee matchup at the Breakdown Tip Off Classic on Saturday.

Lakeville North led 76-72 after a 3-pointer by Tyler Christianson. Park Center missed three shots on the other end. Matt Drake sank one of two free

shots to expand North's lead to 77-72. Park Center then gave up a turnover.

Chavis went to work.

Just as Drake drove for what would have been a seven-point lead, Chavis knocked the ball out of his hands, causing a turnover. Seconds later, Chavis knifed through lane for a layup, got fouled and hit the freebie, making it 77-75. Lakeville North traveled. Chavis darted up the gut again and tied the score 77-77. A moment later, his alley oop pass to Chiang Ring resulted in a lay-in basket for 79-77 lead with 30 seconds left.

Drake was fouled on a drive and swished two free shots with 24 seconds left to regain a tie at 79 for North.

Chavis had the ball for the last 24 seconds. North didn't try to press him. He dallied 30 feet from the hoop on the left side until the clock dipped under eight seconds. He drifted to the right of the free throw circle, and with four seconds left, blew past his defender, right down the middle again, and laid up a feather-soft ball that rustled through the cords at the horn.

Then he disappeared under a mob of bounding, beaming teammates.

Chavis, a 6-foot-2 combo guard signed by Washington, totaled 23 points, nine assists, five steals and seven rebounds. Ring delivered 20 points and 10 rebounds, Jackson Fowlkes 16 points and Xavier Felix 14 points.

For Lakeville North, Wisconsin signee Jack Robison tallied 25 points and snagged nine rebounds. Drake had 17 points and seven assists, and James Fager 12 points and nine rebounds. The Panthers shot 10-for-27 on three-pointers.

Wayzata, Breck, Cherry win as powers joust at Breakdown

Matchups of leading teams at the Breakdown Tip-Off Classic are not only a treat for the fans but also a big help for the scribes who compile the state rankings (i.e., myself and Kevin Anderson for MBBN, who've been able to sort out a few things the last two weeks).

The boys Breakdown on Saturday drew about 3,000 for the two biggest games: Class 4A's top-ranked **Park Center** beating No. 3 **Lakeville North** 81-79 (see page one) and Class 4A's No. 2 **Wayzata** edging Class 3A's No. 1 **Totino-Grace** 83-81.

Jackson McAndrew sank Wayzata's gamewinner on a floating jumper as time ran out. The 6-foot-9 Creighton recruit tallied 38 points and nabbed 11 rebounds. Wyatt McBeth added 11 points, and Brayden Sandmann, Drew Nepstad and Ben Shaffer eight each. For the Eagles, Chase Watley tallied 19 points, and Dothan Ijadimbolla, Isaiah Johnson and Tian Chatman had 17 each.

Breck (No. 1, 2A) prevailed 71-68 over Alexandria (No. 3, 3A). Daniel Freitag, Breck's Wisconsin-bound senior guard, tallied 24 points and eight rebounds. DeAngelo Dungy and Miles Newton chipped in 12 points each and Newton nabbed nine rebounds. Chase Thompson sank 25 points and Mason Witt 12 for Alexandria.

Cherry (No. 1, 1A) squeezed past Holy Family Catholic (No. 2, 2A) 73-69. Isaac Asuma, Cherry's senior guard signed by the Gophers, led with 21 points, nine rebounds and excellent one-on-one defense against both a star guard and an imposing post player. Isaiah Asuma,

SCL's Hauge sets new 3-point mark

Laura Hauge of St. Croix Lutheran is the new state all-time leader in career three-pointers. The senior guard sank four of them during a 77-13 win over Trin-

ity on Tuesday evening, lifting her career total to 460, reported Crusders coach David Mielke. The previous record of 458, by Marissa Janning of Watertown-Mayer (Miss Basketball in 2012) had stood for 11 years.

Hauge, who has committed to St. Thomas, is averaging 23.3 points, 4.9 rebounds and 4.3 assists for the Crusaders (3-4). She has made 26 three's. The most she had in one season was 112 as a sophomore. (Zubich has the single season record of 137.) Hauge scored her first 122 points in seventh grade and currently has close to 2,300. Her three-point accu-

racy was around 44 percent as a sophomore and junior.

In last week's article on Mountain Iron-Buhl star Jordan Zubich, we speculated that she would soon break the three-point mark. Zubich has 430, through Wednesday. State historian Matt Pederson's three-point list at the time did not include Hauge. After reading the Zubich article, Mielke let the MBBN and Pederson know that Hauge would soon break the record. He didn't previously know where to report this information.

Minnesotans leading 'U' women

Four of the top five scorers for the Minnesota Gopher women are home state recruits, led by Mara Braun, sophomore from Wayzata, with 20.2 points per game. Grace Grocholski (North Prairie, WI) averages 10.8 points, Sophie Hart (Farmington) 10.2 points, Amaya Battle (Hopkins) 10.0 points, and Mallory Heyer (Chaska) 9.8 points and a team-leading 8.6 rebounds. The Gophers, under new coach Dawn Plitzuweit, are 10-1, and won their Big Ten opener over Purdue 60-58.

Nevis 0-0 on Dec. 15 after Prep Bowl win

Tevis has gone to three consecutive boys state tournaments and the Tigger naments and the Tigers are ranked in the top five, but they have not played a game yet. The Tigers sat out the first two weeks of the basketball season after most of the roster played on the football team that won the state nine-man championship. Nevis is slated to open tonight (Dec. 15) at LaPorte. "We had a game scheduled earlier that got changed, and then our football team won the state title," coach Scott Kramer explained, "We will make up for it later with a busy schedule, but it worked out for us, with letting our football guys get healed up." Nevis capped a 13-0 football season beating Kingsland 14-12 in the Prep Bowl on Nov. 25. Nevis stopped Kingsland inches short of the end zone late in the game. The basketball team has four starters back from a 26-7 season and state fifth-place finish.

Richfield's Armstrong sinks 50 & 52

C.J. Armstrong of Richfield opened the season with a 50-point game against Two Rivers, leading a 109-92 win, and followed with 52 points in an 83-66 win over St. Cloud Tech. The 6-foot-3 junior guard tallied 30 in an 80-77 win over DeLaSalle on Tuesday evening with Zavier Hayes adding 26. Armstrong averaged 23 points as a sophomore and 7.9 as a freshman. He is just the fourth player in state history with two straight games of 50 or more. The others were Jibrahn Ike of St. Anthony Village (1999 graduate), Kevin Noreen of Minnesota Transitions (2010), who did it twice, and Bjorn Broman of Lakeview Christiann (2015), who did it five times.

Rough start for CLB boys

Cass Lake-Bena, perennial Class 1A boys power, ranked No. 2 on the preseason top twenty, has been hit hard with injuries at the outset of the season. The Panthers lost their opener to Ada-Borup West 66-64 in overtime, then got humbled by Dawson-Boyd 88-39 at the Breakdown, before notching a W on Tuesday over Pine River-Backus 83-41. Kaydin Lee, a fourth-year starter, suffered a fractured ankle against Ada-Borup West and will likely miss six weeks, reported coach Alvin Wind, contacted by the MBBN. Brandon Wind, a junior, will miss three weeks with a back injury. Brandon Masten, sophomore, dislocated his shoulder during the pre-season jamboree and will miss four to six weeks. Coach Wind said this could be a blessing in disguise, as his backups are getting plenty of action. "Stronger bench for the playoffs," he speculated.
