Breck enjoys breakout year



Mustangs 21-0 vs. formidable schedule, eye 1st state crown

reck boys basketball is fly-Ding giddily at an unfamiliar altitude this year. A team entering the season with just one state appearance and no conference titles since 1981 is currently 21-0, atop the Class 2A rankings all season, and could probably be a Top Ten team in Class 4A based on their signature wins.

"State Championship has been our goal since the end of last season," acknowledged coach Harry Sonie, but he added, "We're taking things day by day, game by game, and enjoying the process."

Breck returned four starters who combined for 40 points per game in a 19-9 team last year — and then gained the state's No. 1 college prospect over the summer.

Daniel Freitag, a Wisconsin recruit who averaged 28.5

Asked what adjustments were made with Freitag coming in, Sonie said not many: "Hanif Muhammad is allowed to play off the ball slightly more than the past, which we feel is a positive for our team. Daniel is a high level player with great talent and IQ, and knew exactly now to fit in with a new group of teammates."

Muhammad "can do it all offensively," Sonie said. "He is one of the best on-ball defenders in the state, in my opinion, and he proves it every single night." Musoke is "a very smart player that can defend, finish inside, and shoot the three at a high

Breck has vanquished a long list of ranked teams: Al-Freitag, a 6-foot-2 point guard, is averaging 23.4 exandria (No. 9, 3A) 71-68, Minneapolis North (No. 2, 4A) 87-80, Lake Crystal-Wellcome Memorial (No. 16, 2A) 79-58, Holy Family Catholic (No. 11, 2A) 95-63, Esko (No. 9, 2A) 75-58 and Columbia Heights (No. 12, 3A) 86-67. They have another showdown on Saturday at Class 4A's No. 8 Minneapolis Washburn.

The Independent Metro Athletic Conference title has already been clinched by the Mustangs with a threegame lead on second-place Blake. The IMAC has been dominated by Minnehaha Academy, which has slipped to around .500 this season.

"The conference championship was a very special moment for our boys and the program," Sonie said. "We know how hard it is to win the conference, and it hadn't been done in 43 years at Breck, so it was not taken lightly. That was a goal of ours along the way to our ultimate goal."

About their only two close games, against Alexandria (when the Cardinals, who've had injuries, were still at full strength) and Hopkins, Sonie commented: "Defense was a huge factor. We got crucial stops when we needed them the most in both games. We also executed, and guys made some big plays down the stretch offensively."

Breck is an Episcopal private school, founded in 1886, located in Golden Valley. Its previous boys hoops highlight was advancing to the state finals in 2006 and losing to Braham.

A spate of school records

Coring records were broken at several schools in the past week, the Star-Tribune reported. Amy Thompson, Stillwater senior guard, poured in 48 points in an 80-50 win over Forest Lake, shooting 18-for-27, including 7-for-13 on three's, breaking Sara Scalia's mark of 39 set in 2018. She's averaging 26 points. Nolan Graves, Orono junior guard, blistered the nets for 50 points in a 90-62 win over St. Louis Park, shooting 18for-26 (6-for-11 on three's) and topping Jordan Smith's record of 49 set in 2009. He's averaging 24 points. Eli Hoelz, Brainerd senior guard who recently set a singlegame assist record with 22, grabbed the scoring record as well with a 44-point burst in a 93-51 win over Willmar, topping the record of 41 shared by Dale Brown and Joey Sauer. He averages 16.9 points and 9.6 assists. Alexis Rose, Becker senior guard, sank 41 points in an 81-65 loss to Albany, eclipsing Dani Nuest's record of 39 set in 2021. Rose is averaging 22.9 points.

Nobody over 6' but RLC is 20-0

C teve Philion has coached basketball for almost a half-century and never had a team start 20-0 before. It's been that kind of season as his Red Lake County Rebels are one of only two squads in the state still unbeaten. "Defense is our main strength. We have to play

aggressive, in-yourface defense, because of our lack of size. All nine guys that play are good shooters," said Phlion, who's logged 657 career wins. He had two state tournament teams with Clearbrook-Gonvick in the 1990s and has coached his home town team since 1998.

The pint-sized Rebels, with nobody over

six feet, have beaten everyone by double digits except East Grand Forks (78-77) and Warren-Alvarado-Oslo (71-68). They led EGF 51-30. "Our point guard, Owen Chervestad, sprained his ankle and sat out. We hung on to barely win," he recounted. RLC trailed WAO until late three-pointers by Ben Gullingsrud and Connor Duden helped pull it out.

Duden, a sophomore, and Chervestad, a junior, both went over 1,000 points in the past two weeks. Chervestad is close to 600 rebounds and 500 assists. Both are 6-foot guards. The nine-man rotation also includes eighth-grader Gullingsrud, senior John Powers, juniors Ethan Majeres and Luke Peterson, and sophomores Will Gieseke, Ethan Johnson, and Gunnar Halverson. Duden averages 21.2 points, Chervestad 17.3, and Gieseke 10.5. The Rebels are shooting three's with 35.5 accuracy; six players have between 25 and 48. Defensively, they average 11.5 steals per game.

The Rebels have a fighting chance to become the school's first state tournament boys team, this year or in the next couple. Ranked No. 6, RLC plays in Section 8A, which has No. 4 Fertile-Beltrami, seven-time state qualifier Cass Lake-Bena, and "several other talented teams" who could knock anybody off, Philion said.

College cager from Kerk? Cool!

Kerkhoven-Murdock-Sunburg is not known for turning out college basketball players. DeAndre Holloway is probably the first one from the district since the 1956 graduate whose scoring record he's likely to break soon. Holloway, a 6-foot-7, 195-pound senior who arrived in town as a foster child, is courted

by "high-end D3 and some D2" teams, coach Matt Fragodt reports. One rival coach assessed: "He has a high ceiling, in my opinion. Extremely athletic, long, jumps out of the gym, quick, and gets to the rim like a very good 6-1 guard."

Holloway is averaging 27 points and 11 rebounds, with a high of 44 points, on the heels of his breakout junior year when he logged 23 points, nine rebounds, 2.3 steals and 3.1 blocks per game — and led the Fighting Saints to a 21-6 record, by far their best in this millenium. Although not a big scorer until then, he has passed the 1,300 point marker, nearing the district record of 1,435 points, held for 68 years by Chuck Lierman of Kerkhoven. He has passed the Murdock record of 1,285 held by 1966 grad Ken Gregoire and the KMS record of 1,220 held by 2005 grad Justin Laughlin.

Wally Loven, a retiree who has covered sports for the Kerkhoven Banner since 2003, and was a football/baseball player for "Kerk" in the early 60's, assessed: "I myself have not seen any player at Kerk/Murdock/KMS who can do the things that he does." Last year, Loven noted,

with two teammates injured, Holloway brought the ball up against the press, covered the opponent's best perimeter shooter, and went inside to rebound. "He's a monster inside, and had 18 three-pointers last season," he added. The West Central Tribune made him an All-Area first team pick. Loven can't think of anyone from the district who played college hoops, other than "maybe at Willmar," a nearby junior college -- since Lierman was a Gophers recruit but thwarted by a knee injury. Holloway intends to end that drought. "I want to play college basketball,' he said. "Start somewhere, any level will be fine, and work my way up. I'd be a three, or a four (position)."

Neither KMS, nor Kerkhoven or Murdock before they merged in 1978, has never gotten close to a state tournament in boys basketball. The KMS boys are usually below .500. There was one recent four-year stretch with a record of two wins and 98 losses (2012-17). KMS has fielded some great wrestling teams. One season not long ago, Loven said, two wrestlers volunteered to leave their favorite sport and join the basketball team as

a good deed for the school because it was dangerously short of players.

So, last year's 21-6 season was quite a thrill for the community. Currently KMS is 11-8 despite having such a dynamic player, due in large part to football injuries that sidelined two seniors who were starters the last two years. Holloway said the team is "working hard" and still hopes to make a run like last year.

KMS landed its future star when Rachael Gunderson of Kerkhoven took on DeAndre as a foster child. "I got here in seventh grade, and I've never left," said Holloway. When Rachael subsequently married, she and her husband adopted DeAndre.

Back to Chuck Lierman: Loven has been trying to find out whatever he can about about the fifties phenom for an article when Holloway breaks the record. Bear in mind that 1,435 points in the mid-50's would be similar to about 2,500 today. They had shorter schedules, no three-point shots, and slower paced games. Lierman went to the U of M, recruited by coach Ozzie Cowles and awarded a

Williams scholarship. He would have played with prep legends like Norm Grow of Foley and Ron Johnson of New Prague. Unfortunately, he had knee surgery his first year there. Knee injuries that can be repaired now were often career-killers back then, and Lierman had to drop out of basketball. "He was pretty much never heard from again," Loven said. Loven recently found a 1956 teammate. "He said (Lierman) could shoot from anywhere on the half court." He had a 39-point game in the District 20 semifinals before the Eagles lost to Willmar. The sports writer mused that it's "been an interesting research" in connecting this star from almost 70 years ago to the current luminary.


Traits of the Greats



've been fortunate to have a front row seat, watch-Ling many of the best head coaches succeed "behind the scenes".

Here is my list of the most important characteristics of a great head coach:

- 1) **Recruiter of talent** recruits the best talent (under the school roof for HS) to become a participant in the program.
- Recruiter of parents/volunteers from the community - recruits dedicated people to help coach and coordinate teams, raise funds, and work in fund-raising events. Develops an "It takes a village to raise a team."





- Student of the game seeks further knowledge for self and all coaches in the program by attending clinics, reading, researching, learning from the best, scouting.
- **Educator of the game** develops coaching talent by speaking and teaching at every grade level and involving other coaches in the process to sharpen skills.
- Coordinator of over-all program provides a sense of unity with a plan and theme throughout all ages of players as well as the team of people working in the program.
- Standard bearer sets goals and standards for the players and teams in the program that encourage players to join and parents to support.
- 8) Role model of behavioral standards sets standards of behavior and sportsmanship that are established for all ages and modeled by the coaches and high school teams on the floor.
- 9) Developer of team loyalty in young players includes young players in varsity games – halftime recognition, halftime games, seating behind the team. Provides mascot gear in school colors for players FREE or at reasonable prices.
- 10) Creator of fun develops events that are fun to get everyone in the program involved.

Great coaches:

- Teach DEFENSE first It is the most dependable team skill.
- B) **Teach "aggression"** Aggressor wins.
- C) Teach TEAM values Team is everything, discourage individualism.

In my lifetime, the two most consistently successful teams were the Boston Celtics and the UCLA men. The Celtics won NBA championships in 11 of 13 years from 1957 to 1969, including 8 in a row. UCLA won NCAA championships in 10 of 12 years, including 7 in a row. The Celtics won with team unity, great defense, aggressive offense movement, and a team first attitude. Start with tenacious defense to create turnovers. Fastbreak from turnovers at every opportunity. When slowed down, be the aggressor with non-stop movement – picks, screens, drives – and get the ball to the person most open to score. Dive to save a loose ball or create a jump ball, deflect a pass that starts a fastbreak, strip the ball from ballhandlers, take charges – and take "delight" in all of it as do the team's bench players and fans, who have all developed a high basketball IQ, understanding all the exciting little things that make a championship team.

John Wooden, head coach at UCLA, set a high standard of behavior for his players and insisted on players adhering to team basketball principles. I loved listening to an audio "talk" by Coach Wooden and played it to kids in camps for many years. My favorite was his orange peelings story. He talked about players being given oranges for energy during halftime or during a break in practice. After the players left the room, he noted which ones threw away their peelings and which ones left the peelings for someone else to clean up. Guess which ones he wanted on his team? He wanted a "team" mentality at the core of his players' souls.

In Minnesota high school basketball, two coaches have reached 1,000 wins: Bob McDonald at Chisholm (boys) and Mike Dreier at New London-Spicer (girls). Bob had the gym open 365 days a year with lower baskets for little kids. That alone gave Bluestreak basketball a big advantage.

Coach McDonald had a sharp wit and a delight in relating to people. At his son Paul's wedding, he picked up my little 2-year old son. "Hmmm...gonna be a big

one." At a coaching clinic he joked that his coaching staff would circulate around town and prick holes in contraceptives. His team's often outscored opponents by big numbers, but he kept his starters in. He didn't feel his starters should be penalized playing time because opponents hadn't worked as hard as they had. At a camp one day in the Chisholm gym, I sat a player out for losing his cool – getting angry and crying in a rage. Coach McDonald marched over, and I wondered if I might soon receive a scolding. He went straight to the player – probably a 4th-5th grader – and scolded him. The boy sniffed up his sobs and soon he was back in the game.

Mike Dreier is a detailist. Like Bob McDonald, he knows all of his players from birth, and teaches all of his coaches to coach what he coaches at every level. The players know very well what to do in every situation and seem to go about their business on the court with an eery calm. If they slip up, that sharp, penetrating Dreier shriek, almost, reminds them quickly. It's like a karate jab to the abdomen to pay attention. Coach Dreier also employs a John Wooden strategy – a full-court 2-2-1 press for the whole game after made baskets – just waiting for the other team to throw an errant pass. His Wildcats have "gone to state" a state-record 20 times. Coach Dreier also has the record for the most teams entered in Pacesetter tournaments, so he will always be my hero. We jokingly named our in-home office addition: "The Dreier Wing".

Two of the most successful high school coaches are Kenny Novak Jr. and Brian Cosgriff, who led countless teams to state at Hopkins and have won 15 state championships between them. I haven't observed them on a day-to-day basis, but which two coaches ask to be in the Pacesetter "Sweet 16" every year – and which two deserve it every year? Just saying.... Coach Cosgriff is now at Minnetonka with a solid chance of winning another state title.

Regardless of the win-loss record, great coaches continue to set high standards of on-court and off-court behavior as a first priority, care about their kids and families, and give their players every chance to succeed in their sport and in life.

Like one of the greatest coaches to ever coach the game, Pat Dewey of Sandstone, shared with me as his motto for his players: "Do your best, be nice." Five words that fit on five fingers. Pure in its simplicity – that covers it all. No one can ever ask more of a player, coach, or human being.



Another soph star gets 3,000

Minnesota Basketball News

Maddyn Greenway of Providence Academy cracked the 3,000-point marker while scoring 44 points against Maple Grove at home Friday, Feb. 2. Maple Grove beat the Lions 86-80 with Jordan Ode sinking 33 points, and Claire Stern and Ava Cossette 17 each. Greenway reached 3,000 three days after watching Crosby-Ironton's Tori Oehrlein do the same against her own team. Providence won that game 93-75. They are the only two sophomores in the state ever to reach 3,000.

Emmerson Helget, Annandale junior, sank 13 of 17 three-pointers and totaled 41 points in a 75-44 win over Dassel-Cokato on Feb. 2. Her 13 three's tied the state record held by Sari Noga of Parkers Prairie (2008) and Makayla VanNett of Como Park (2017).

AROUND THE STATE

Ari Peterson, Providence Academy eighth-grader, has already gotten a scholarship offer from the Gophers. The fleet, lanky daughter of former Viking great Adrian Peterson is averaging 11 points and seven rebounds. She posted this on instagram on Jan. 31: "After a nice talk with Coach Plitzuweit, I am blessed and excited go receive my first offer from the University of Minnesota. Go Gophers!"

Wayzata boys outlasted Minnetonka 98-87 in a matchup of two of the top three ranked teams in Class 4A on Feb. 1 with Jackson McAndrew drilling 31 points and Christian Wiggins 28. Andy Stefanowicz had 27, Greyson Ueland 18 and Jordan Cain 17 for Tonka. Wayzata then edged DeLaSalle 63-62 two days later with McAndrew sinking 22 points and Wyatt McBeth 13. Ray James Jr. had 16 and Jaden Morgan 15 for the Islanders. Wayzata and Edina share the Lake Conference lead with 5-1 records.

Chad Johnston, coach of three state champion girls teams at Minneota, logged his 500th victory as coach of the boys team on Jan. 29 when the Vikings beat Kerkhoven-Murdock-Sunburg 75-70 at home. In the same game, senior guard Max Rost scored 25 points and went over the 1,000-point marker. Johnston coached the Viking girls for 21 seasons, compiling a 478-116 record with Class 1A titles in 2013, 2019 and 2021, plus two state runners-up. His first boys team last year was 8-17. This year's team is 16-6. Currently, his record is 502-139.

Totino-Grace boys earned a season sweep of Park Center 75-63 on Friday as Chase Watley hit 27 points and Isaiah Johnson-Arigu 26. The Class 3A and 4A powers meet twice a year in the Northwest Suburban Conference. Those are the Pirates' only two losses.

Dawson-Boyd lost to Castlewood 49-46 on Feb. 2 in a duel of No. 2 ranked teams in the smallest classes in Minnesota and South Dakota. Lane Tveldt scored 21 points for Castelwood (14-2). Brayson Boike scored 18 and Gunner Liebl 12 for the Blackjacks (20-2).

ast Grand Forks and Kittson County Central waged a grueling double OT battle Tuesday with EGF prevailing 101-97 in Hallock. Tatem Votava sank 29 points for EFG (17-5) and her 3-pointer with 26 seconds left in regulation tied the score at 79. It was still knotted at 88 after one OT. 
