Girls tip-off: champ coaches assess fields

Minnesota Basketball News will publish six larger editions in 2024-25 rather than weekly issues as in previous seasons. Issues scheduled include pre-season girls, pre-season boys, mid-season in January, pre-tournament in February, state coverage for girls and state coverage for boys. Spring and summer issues will also be published. MBBN will also be compiling weekly Top 10 rankings and posting them on our website.

For this preview issue, MBBN interviewed the coaches of the four state champions to get their take on the top teams. All four of those teams remain strong contenders. We are referencing the Breakdown preview book's pre-season rankings for girls.

CLASS 4A -- Minnetonka, Class 4A champion, had a huge loss a month before school started when Aaliyah Crump, a leading contender for Miss Basketball, announced that she would spend her senior year with a Florida prep school. Another all-stater last year, Tori McKinney, is now with the Gophers.

Don't send coach Brian Cosgriff any sympathy cards. The Skippers have one of the state's best floor leaders in junior Lanelle Wright, and they picked up two outstanding transfers, freshman forward Ari Peterson from

Providence Academy and sophomore guard Jazmin Daing from Rochester John Marshall.

"We gained a couple of good players," acknowledged Cosgriff. "And then, Lanelle Wright, I think is a top-five player in the state. Nobody I've ever coached has worked as hard as she has. So, we are young. We'll just go and see what we can do."

About Crump, he said, "It would have been a really good situation if she had stayed, right? But I want her to be happy and if that's going to make her happy and she feels it's the best move for her, I support her 100 percent."

Cosgriff had a quick answer when asked who the other top contenders were: "The Lake Conference. As usual. From top to bottom."

The Breakdown's list is headed by five Lake teams: Hopkins, Wayzata, Minnetonka, Eden Prairie and St. Michael-Albertville. The next five are Lakeville North, Maple Grove, Lakeville South, Prior Lake and Stillwater.

"A lot of us play in the same section, though," Cosgriff said. "Two years ago, Eden Prairie finished third in the state, and they were fifth in our conference. We won state last year, and we were second in the conference."

The Lake has had all six state finalists the last three years with Minnetonka beating Hopkins in 2024, St. Michael-Albertville beating Hopkins in 2023 and Hopkins beating STMA in 2022. The Lake has claimed 10 of the last 15 state titles. The non-Lake state champs were Lakeville North in 2010, Eastview in 2014 and 2018, Elk River in 2017 and Chaska in 2021.

CLASS 3A -- Benilde-St. Margaret's, Class 3A champs two straight years, also lost a superstar, Olivia Olson, the 2024 Miss Basketball, now playing for Michigan. They're led by senior guards Kendall McGee, a Creighton recruit, and Zahara Bishop, a Seton Hall recruit. McGee missed last season with an injury after averaging 20 points as a sophomore.

"Obviously, we lost an All-American, but we return everybody else," said coach Tim Ellefson. "Having seven kids who've won state championships is nice. The biggest thing we'll need to fill is rebounding."

About the 3A field, he noted, "DeLaSalle (last year's runner-up) is going to be a tough out. They are very talented. Girls who can break you off the dribble. Alexandria is really well coached. They play a flawless type of basketball and don't make a lot of mistakes. Then there are some wild cards. Delano in our section had a really good record last year. Marshall is always a team to look out for. Their coaching is second to none, and I know they knocked off Alexandria last week. Stewartville has a couple dynamic players. So, it's going to be a battle."

Breakdown has Alexandria, led by Hadley Thul, fresh from leading their volleyball team to the state title, in the top spot. The Cardinals placed third last year and have everybody back. Following are Stewartville, BSM, Byron, DeLaSalle, Rock Ridge, Mahtomedi, New Ulm, Delano, and St. Peter.

CLASS 2A -- Providence Academy has captured three straight titles in Class 2A, with a chance for four or five with superstar guard Maddyn Greenway just entering her junior year. The Lions lost Ari Peterson (12 ppg as an eighth-grader) to Minnetonka and Brooke Hohebecker (11.2 ppg) to graduation, but defeated a Class 4A top-ten, Maple Grove, 82-25 in their opener. "We're obviously going to miss (Peterson) but it's just oppor-

tunities for more girls to step up," said coach Connor Goetz. "Instead of two superstars it's one superstar and a whole lot of supporting girls, girls who can be really talented too."

About the 2A field, Goetz noted, enthusiastically, "We've got some of the best individuals in the state in our class — Chloe Johnson (Duluth Marshall), Tori Oehrlein (Crosby-Ironton), Addi Mack (Minnehaha Academy) and Maddyn. That is an amazing collection of talent."

As for top teams, he said, "I'd say Crosby, Minnehaha, Jordan, New London-Spicer, Duluth Marshall, and Sauk Centre, just off the top of my head."

Breakdown's top ten are Providence Academy, Minnehaha Academy, Sauk Centre, Crosby-Ironton, Duluth Marshall, Jordan, Visitation, New London-Spicer, Minnewaska Area and Winona Cotter.

CLASS 1A -- Goodhue rolled to the Class 1A crown last year led by guard Elisabeth Gadiant, who graduated, and forward Kendyl Lodemeier, now a senior. "I do think we will end up having a pretty strong team this year," coach Josh Wieme said. While Gadiant's graduation leaves "a giant hole," they lost only two seniors.

"We have seven players back who got a lot of experience and are now in a position to expand their roles in order to keep it going. Kendyl Lodermeier is a fantastic player to start with and work around. Our new PG Natalie Thomforde had a great playoff/state tournament to give her a lot of confidence. We look to be a deep team that will play 9-10 players regularly."

After a grueling Hiawatha Valley schedule that includes 3A, 2A and 1A teams, they'll tackle their sectional. Scanning the state field, he noted, "Mayer Lutheran, Hancock, and Underwood all appear to be very strong teams that can figure into the title picture. I believe we should be in that discussion as well, but I also know how the post-season goes and there are even more good teams out there that are going to be capable of knocking a team off."

Breakdown tabs Goodhue No. 1, followed by Hancock, Mountain Iron-Buhl, Mayer Lutheran, Underwood, Sleepy Eye-St. Mary's, Buffalo Lake-Hector-Stewart, Minneota, Lester Prairie and Spring Grove.

Champs duel: Tonka tips BSM

Clashes of state powers dotted the schedule of the annual season opening Breakdown Girls Tip-Off Classic, as usual, Saturday at Southwest Christian in Chaska. Among them:

Minnetonka tripped Benilde-St. Margaret's 60-54 in a clash of reigning state champions with junior point guard Lanelle Wright pouring in 28 points. Ari Peterson, their freshman transfer from Providence Academy who's already had an offer from the Gophers, added 11 points. Zahara Bishop pumped in 21 points for BSM and Kendall McGee added 10.

BREAKDOWN TIP-OFF CLASSIC

Providence Academy got 39 points from Maddyn Greenway and rallied to beat Maple Gove 82-65. The Lions trailed by nine in the second half before putting on a press that reaped some turnovers and changed the momentum. Beckett Greenway, Emma Millerbernd and McKenna Schaefer added 10 points each and Hope Counts eight points and 11 rebounds. For the Crimson, Addie Hanna netted 17 points, Jordan Ode 16, Kate Holmquist 14 and Sophie Anderson 10.

Orono clipped Minnehaha Academy 71-67 in a back-and-forth game, led by Mya Moore with 20 points, Evelyn Miller 16 and Amelia Schwendimann 12. Moore also made 10 assists. For Minnehaha, Addi Mack sank

32 points, including 15 free shots. Briana Foster added 13 points and Amina Allen 10.

Alexandria topped Stewartville 54-40 in a duel of 2024 Class 3A state tournament teams. Chloe Scholl tallied 15 points, MaCee Linow 13 and Hadley Thul 13. The Cardinals shut down the Tigers except for Audrey Schindelar tossing in 24 points.

Girls recruiting roundup

Greenway to Kentucky; Oehrlein to Gophers

Maddyn Greenway, one of the most high-profile girls basketball stars in state history, leading Providence Academy to three consecutive state Class 2A titles, has verbally committed to Kentucky prior to her junior season.

The fleet 5-foot-8 guard is the top ranked junior in Minnesota and ranked 18th nationally by ESPN. She averaged 34.3 points as a sophomore, 31.8 as a freshman and 23.7 as an eighth grader on state champion teams and 21.0 as a seventh-grader on a state runner-up team.

Speculation was that Iowa would be her destination as her father (former Viking star Chad) and mother were Hawkeyes. Greenway told the Star-Tribune that she has “always been a Hawkeye fan” and her parents were pulling for Iowa, but they “never put any pressure on me where to go.”

Greenway visited Kentucky early November and immediately loved the place, picking the Wildcats over 40 other suitors. Kenny Brooks, first-year Kentucky coach, started recruiting her when he coached Virginia Tech.

Oehrlein, Ramlall choose U of M

Tori Oehrlein, Crosby-Ironton 5-foot-11 junior guard, and Amisha Ramlall, Rosemount 5-foot-11 sophomore guard, have both verbally committed to the Minnesota Gophers and coach Dawn Plitzuweit. Oehrlein, the No. 2 ranked Minnesota prospect for 2026, and 43rd nationally by 247 Sports, averaged 35.4 points, 15.2 rebounds, and 7.2 assists as a junior, leading the Rangers to fourth place in the Class 2A tournament. She reached 3,000 career points last season, the earliest of any player in state history, in her 101st game. Ramlall, ranked No. 3 in her class by Prep Girls Hoops, averaged 17.7 points as a freshman and shot 44 percent on three-points.

Mack headed for Maryland

Addi Mack, a 3,000-point scorer for Minnehaha Academy who capped her junior year with a 53-point game in the state Class 2A third-place game last March, will play for Maryland, perennial NCAA entrant. The 5-foot-8 guard averaged 32 points last season. She’s a four-star prospect ranked No. 2 in the state for the 2025 class and No. 100 nationally by HoopGurlz.

Ode to Michigan State

Jordan Ode, Maple Grove guard who’s the top-ranked senior in Minnesota, committed to Michigan State before her junior season. She averaged 21 points, 3.3 assists and five steals last year, leading the Crimson to fourth place in the state 4A tournament..

More signings

Kendall McGee and Zahra Bishop of Benilde-St. Margaret’s, state Class 3A champions the last two years, have picked their colleges. McGee, who averaged 20 points as a sophomore and missed her junior year with an injury, has signed with Creighton. Bishop, who averaged 15.7 points last season, has signed with Seton Hall. BSM’s 2024 Miss Basketball, Olivia Olson, is playing for Michigan State.

Alexandria, a top-five Class 3A team, has three players who’ve committed: Hadley Thul to South Dakota State, MaCee Linow to Bemidji State, and Allie Haabala to Southwest Minnesota.

Maple Grove’s senior triplets will go their separate ways as Addie Hanna signed with Augustana, Bella with Michigan Tech and Lexi with Missouri St. Louis.

Hopkins, perennial 4A power, has two seniors who’ve signed, Lauren Hillesheim to North Dakota and Tatum Woodson to Belmont.

Aneisha Scott, dynamic guard who led DeLaSalle to a state runner-up finish last year, signed with Richmond. Also heading for Division I teams are Eden Prairie’s Rae Ehrmann (Montana), Prior Lake’s Haven Fisher (Tulsa) and Breanna Bowman (Colorado State), Wayzata’s Sophie Hawkinson (North Dakota State), and Centennial’s Autumn McCall (St. Thomas).

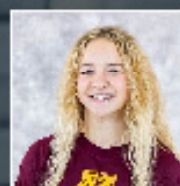
